He has given talks on statistical literacy in more than a dozen countries. Milo Schield is a professor in Business Administration at Augsburg College with a Ph.D. in Space Physics from Rice University. He was the Director of the W. M. Keck Statistical Literacy project – a project “to develop statistical literacy as an interdisciplinary curriculum in the liberal arts.” He has been chair of the Business Department: the largest department at Augsburg. He has taught traditional statistics and critical thinking for more than 20 years at the undergraduate and graduate levels. He developed and teaches a Statistical Literacy course for Citizens that helps students read and interpret statistics found in news stories, tables and graphs. He also teaches a Statistical Literacy course for Decision Makers that focuses more on models, distributions and statistical significance using Excel. Both courses help students use ordinary English to properly describe and compare rates and percentages. He has given 37 talks in 18 countries outside the US. His 70+ papers have been cited almost a thousand times. Schield is the US representative to the International Statistical Literacy project, an elected member of the International Statistical Institute, the Vice-President of the National Numeracy Network (NNN) and webmaster of www.StatLit.org: Google-rated as the #1 web site for statistical literacy with more than 300,000 visits and 450,000 downloads in 2016.
